RN-DWR Principles

The RN-DWR is a network that conducts research on paid domestic labour in cooperation with domestic workers; as such, the RN-DWR aims to support their efforts to achieve rights, respect and recognition. We coordinate and conduct our research based on the following principles:

- Conducting meaningful, quality research that meets the needs of domestic worker organizing efforts
- Remaining accountable to domestic workers by consulting representatives of the International Domestic Workers' Federation (IDWF) and other domestic workers' organizations
- Presenting, publishing and disseminating research results to promote domestic workers' activities and campaigns for rights
- Making research results accessible to domestic workers and their organizations
- Conducting research in a principled way that respects and supports the empowerment of domestic workers
- 6. Building a community of like-minded researchers in the field
- Cultivating trusting, communicative relationships with researchers and representatives of IDWF and domestic workers' organizations.



Origination of the RN-DWR

Around the world numerous researchers are involved in research on paid domestic work, frequently in collaboration with domestic workers and their organizations. These research efforts are barely connected. Therefore, researchers affiliated with the International Center for Development and Decent Work, the Global Labour University, and the International Domestic Workers Federation and other individuals have started the RN-DWR initiative in 2009. During meetings we established that we shared a commitment not only to research domestic work, but also to collaborate with domestic workers both on research and on advocating for their rights. On this basis, the RN-DWR was constituted in December 2010 at a workshop hosted by the Dutch trade union FNV Bondgenoten, with a decision to officially launch the Domestic Worker Research Network at the International Labour Conference in June 2011. In 2014 we published the manual "We want to be the protagonists of our own stories'. A manual on how domestic workers and researchers can jointly conduct research". The manual is a result of a collaborative research project of the network on the social security needs of domestic workers.
